The ***South Dakota e-Labor Bulletin*** is a monthly electronic publication available from the Labor Market Information Center of the South Dakota Department of Labor and Regulation.

The ***e-Labor Bulletin*** allows businesses and individuals to evaluate state-specific economic analysis and statistics. Tables show the most recent monthly data on labor supply, labor force (including unemployment rates), nonfarm worker levels by industry, annualized pay of workers, national economic indicators including the Consumer Price Index, and measures of activities of the Department of Labor and Regulation's Unemployment Insurance Division and local offices. The tables include comparisons to month-ago and year-ago data as well. Articles provide analysis of current industry trends and other timely labor market issues.
