



MAJOR CONTRIBUTOR TO SD ECONOMY

The Manufacturing industry accounts for 12% of the state's employment in privately owned establishments and 13% of total payrolls.



EMPLOYMENT GROWTH

The Manufacturing industry has added 659 workers in South Dakota over the last five years (growth of 1.5%).



CURRENT OPPORTUNITIES

There are currently more than 1,300 South Dakota Manufacturing job openings advertised online.



PROMISING FUTURE

Employment in Manufacturing is projected to increase by 8% by 2030. The industry is also promising because it offers employment opportunities in many of the state's Hot Careers.



More MANUFACTURING Stats

- South Dakota's **Manufacturing** industry is an important source of employment, with 45,101 workers (12.2% of all workers in privately owned establishments) in 2022.
- Manufacturing also plays a big role in earnings, accounting for 13.2% of the state's privately owned establishment payrolls in 2022.
- The number of workers in South Dakota's **Manufacturing** industry increased 1.5% from 2018 to 2022, adding 659 workers to the state's economy.
- There are currently more than 1,300 Manufacturing job openings advertised online in South Dakota.
- South Dakota's **Manufacturing** industry is projected to add 3,533 workers by 2030 (from a level of 43,132 in 2020 to 46,665 in 2030, an 8.2% increase).
- Of South Dakota's 69 Hot Careers (high demand, high wage occupations), six are found predominately in Manufacturing (highlighted below). An additional 17 also offer employment opportunities in the industry. Hot Career occupations have greater than average projected demand (more than 83 per year) and an average wage greater than \$39,870 (the median wage across all occupations in 2022).
