NONTRADITIONAL OCCUPATION

The term "non-traditional employment" refers to occupations or fields of work for which individuals from the gender involved comprise less than 25 percent of the individuals employed in each such occupation or field of work.

The One-Stop delivery system shall include information to individuals regarding Nontraditional occupations/employment.

Nontraditional occupations for South Dakota are acquired through the Equal Employment Opportunity Tabulation 2006-2010 (5 year American Community Survey Data). This source contains the most detailed occupations, includes 2010 SOC codes for reference and is primary benchmark for conducting comparisons between the racial, ethnic and sex composition of each employer's workforce to its available labor market. According to the U.S Census bureau the next release will be the end of 2020 or the first half of 2021. The crosswalk of Full List of 2010 Census Detailed Occupation Codes to EEO is included in Attachment A.
