



RESOLUTION OF COOPERATION

to Facilitate Interstate Licensure for Professional Engineers and Professional Surveyors

- WHEREAS, The National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES) is a national organization created by state licensing boards in 1920 to facilitate professional licensing mobility and promote uniformity of the U.S. licensure processes through services for its member licensing boards and licensees; and
- WHEREAS, The NCEES' members are the engineering and surveying licensure boards from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands; and
- WHEREAS, The mission of NCEES is to advance licensure for engineers and surveyors in order to safeguard the health, safety, and welfare of the public; and
- WHEREAS, The NCEES Model Law, Model Rules, and Manual of Policy and Position Statements are publications adopted by the membership of NCEES; and
- WHEREAS, The adopted model licensure concepts within these publications set a common standard for licensure mobility and portability among its member boards to facilitate an efficient, streamlined, expedited administrative procedure and approval process; and
- WHEREAS, Alignment of licensure processes and requirements is imperative to facilitate portability of licenses between member boards of NCEES; and
- WHEREAS, Increased licensure portability aligns with government initiatives to diversify economies and support economic growth; and
- WHEREAS, In the absence of licensure portability efforts, barriers to licensure can remain in variable state laws, rules, administrative procedures and approval processes; and
- WHEREAS, Barriers to licensure, whether perceived or real, threaten the health, safety and welfare of the public by the potential for legislative action that erodes professional licensing regulation and may also perpetuate or introduce unnecessary bureaucratic processes that an applicant must undertake, which potentially could become barriers to employment; and
- WHEREAS, It is recognized that some member boards may have challenges, such as staffing or obtaining authority to revise statutes and rules which may impede streamlined processes; and
- WHEREAS, The NCEES will commemorate 100 years of advancing licensure through the licensing of professional engineers and land surveyors in 2020; therefore, be it

- RESOLVED, That the following signatories agree to license a NCEES Model Law comity applicant that meets national standards in the most expeditious manner available within the scope of current state licensing laws and rules; and furthermore be it
- RESOLVED, That signatory boards are committed to identifying and working to remove barriers to licensure portability and mobility which are not in the best interest of the public and not required to fulfill the mission of safeguarding the health, safety, and welfare of the public; and furthermore be it
- RESOLVED, That signatory boards are committed to work towards revising current licensing laws, rules, and policies to allow for more streamlined approval processes for NCEES Model Law applicants and other qualifying applicants in my state or jurisdiction; and furthermore be it
- RESOLVED, That signatory boards are committed to minimizing or eliminating unnecessary state or jurisdiction specific licensure requirements.

The title of the proposed resolution "RESOLUTION OF COOPERATION to Facilitate Interstate Licensure for Professional Engineers and Professional Surveyors" meets NCEES' mission and vision (which has been accepted by the member boards). However, the language in the agreement moves beyond the mission and vision of NCEES, as well as the title of the resolution, by extending into Global markets and portability. If we are asking our State Boards and our State lawmakers to tackle international portability in our laws and processes then I believe NCEES, as a full membership, should be providing well vetted changes to our mission and vision. I have spoken to our AG's office regarding the proposed resolution (which unilaterally changes NCEES's mission and vision) and we will not be signing it.

However, if the intent of the resolution is to work together as member boards to recommit to our mission and vision to remove barriers between member states then the language I proposed is to that point.



FY20 COMMITTEES, SUBCOMMITTEES, AND WORK GROUP DESCRIPTIONS

Experience and Education Committees

Education Committee (EDU)

Members of the Education Committee contribute to the development of programs and initiatives impacting architectural education. Examples of initiatives include development of the NCARB Education Standards, education alternatives for NCARB Certification, Integrated Path to Architectural Licensure (IPAL), life-long learning, and the NCARB Award.

Volunteers should meet the following qualifications:

- Be an architect, educator, licensure candidate, or Member Board Member, including Public Member or Member Board Executive.
- Preference will be given to individuals who are participating in or have participated in NCARB's Architecture Experience Program (AXP), and/or have an understanding of the education and experience requirements for licensure, be an educator, supervisor or mentor of individuals gaining required education and experience, and a commitment to supporting individuals pursuing a career in architecture.

Volunteer Expectations

- Willingness to collaborate in a virtual environment (phone/online).
- This committee will hold one face-to-face meeting plus virtual calls for planning and homework.

Continuing Education Subcommittee

Members of the Continuing Education Subcommittee contribute to the development of continuing education related initiatives. Examples include NCARB's Monograph program and collaboration with the AIA to evaluate HSW content of proposed seminars and tours for their national convention.

Volunteers should meet the following qualifications:

- Be an architect, educator, licensure candidate, Member Board Member including Public Member or Member Board Executive.
- Volunteers should have participated in NCARB's Architecture Experience program
 (AXP), and/or have an interest in the continuing education requirements for licensure
 renewal, as well as the experience requirements for initial licensure, and a commitment
 to supporting life-long learning in architecture careers.

Volunteer Expectations

- Willingness to collaborate in a virtual environment (phone/online).
- All work by this committee will be conducted virtually.



Continuing Education Evaluation Workgroup

Members of the Continuing Education Evaluation Workgroup will have the opportunity to participate in continuing education programs, seminars, and courses of their choice. Upon completion of the continuing education course, volunteers will complete an evaluation of the course content. These evaluations will encourage dialog with providers of continuing education to ensure the quality of available continuing education.

Interested individuals should meet the following qualifications:

• Be an architect.

Volunteer Expectations

- Willingness to collaborate in a virtual environment (phone/online).
- All work by this committee will be conducted virtually.
- Submit at least one written evaluation.

Certification Alternatives Review Team

Members of the Certification Alternatives Review Team will review portfolios prepared by architects to support their application for NCARB Certification through alternative education and examination requirements. This includes applicants for NCARB certification through the Tri-National Agreement with Mexico and Canada. Review of portfolios will be performed virtually through a work-flow process. Any required interviews will be convened through video conferencing.

Volunteers should meet the following qualifications:

- Be an architect.
- Volunteers must have a thorough understanding of the education, experience, and examination requirements for initial and reciprocal licensure, preferably have participated in NCARB's Architecture Experience program (AXP), be an educator, supervisor or mentor of individuals gaining required education and experience, and a commitment to supporting architects pursuing reciprocal licensure.

Volunteer Expectations:

- Willingness to collaborate in a virtual environment (phone/online).
- All work by this committee will be conducted virtually plus one in-person training.
- Individuals selected to serve on this team are likely to be reappointed for up to three terms.



Experience Committee (EC)

Members of the Experience Committee contribute to the development of programs and initiatives impacting the architecture experience requirement. Examples of initiatives include development of the Architectural Experience Program (AXP). Volunteers on the Experience Committee also serve on the Experience Advisory Committee (EAC) which is comprised of the EC and representatives from collateral and allied organizations.

Volunteers should meet the following qualifications:

- Be an architect, educator, licensure candidate, Member Board Member including Public Member or Member Board Executive.
- Volunteers must be participating in or have participated in NCARB's Architecture
 Experience Program (AXP) and/or have an understanding of the education and
 experience requirements for licensure, be a supervisor or mentor of individuals gaining
 required education and experience, and a commitment to supporting individuals
 pursuing a career in architecture.

Volunteer Expectations:

- Willingness to collaborate in a virtual environment (phone/online).
- In conjunction with the Experience Advisory Committee (EAC), it is anticipated that this committee will hold one face-to-face meeting plus virtual calls for planning and homework.

National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB) Visiting Team

National Architectural Accrediting Board Visiting Teams evaluate professional degree programs in architecture against the Conditions for Accreditation established by the NAAB. Teams conduct visits for initial candidacy, continuation of candidacy, initial accreditation, and continuation of accreditation. Interested individuals may be nominated for consideration by the NAAB to be included in NAAB's roster of individuals from which the NAAB establishes accreditation teams. Individuals accepted by the NAAB will remain on that list for a four-year period. The NAAB is solely responsible for selecting Visiting Team members for any visit and all visiting teams must be confirmed by the program.

Volunteers should meet the following qualifications:

- Be an architect.
- Have an understanding of the education, experience, and examination requirements for licensure, preferably have participated in NCARB's Architectural Experience Program (AXP), be an educator, supervisor or mentor of individuals gaining required education and experience and demonstrate a commitment to supporting architecture education and individuals pursuing a career in architecture.
- The NAAB is especially interested in expanding the number of individuals fluent in other languages, especially Spanish and French, as well as persons from traditionally underrepresented groups.



• Submit a resume to NCARB upon expression of interest and complete a team member nomination form if selected for the pool.

Volunteer Expectations:

- Individuals recommended by NCARB to serve in the pool must commit to make themselves available for NAAB Team Member Training and must be available to serve on NAAB Visiting Teams from January to April and from September to November. The NAAB will provide options of which visit you can participate on.
- Team visits last three to four days depending on the type of visit; generally, visits begin on Saturday afternoons and end on Wednesdays at noon.



Examination Committees

Examination Committee

Members of the Examination Committee oversee the research initiatives related to the development, delivery, and assessment of the Architect Registration Examination (ARE) for use by all 55 licensing boards. This committee is composed of the Chairs of the ARE subcommittees and task forces, as well as a limited number of at-large members necessary to provide insight from the perspectives of educators, recently licensed, and the public.

Volunteers should meet the following qualifications:

• Be an architect, educator, licensure candidate, Member Board Member including Public Member or Member Board Executive with previous experience on an examrelated committee or have a strong interest in the strategic direction of the ARE.

Volunteer Expectations:

- Willingness to collaborate in a virtual environment (phone/online).
- It is anticipated that this Committee will meet for three (3) two-day face-to-face meetings during the fiscal year, as well as participate in online web meetings.
- · Homework will be assigned prior to each meeting.

ARE Item Writing Opportunities

In FY20, two distinct item writing opportunities will be available to interested volunteers.

- 1. The ARE 5.0 Item Development Subcommittee will continue its typical work of developing content and reviewing operational items for the ongoing delivery of ARE 5.0.
- 2. In FY2O, NCARB will begin development of separate ARE item banks that support the goal of having items secured for the purpose of business continuity in the case of a large-scale content breach or disclosure of operational items. The Business Continuity Exam (BCE) workgroups are an additional item writing opportunity that includes targeting item writing to assemble a complete exam form for each division.

Volunteers writing items have been selected to join either the ARE 5.0 Item Development Subcommittee, with an assignment to one divisional working group, or a BCE Workgroup. In either case, each workgroup focuses on one division of ARE 5.0. For both opportunities, members will write, review, and edit items to be used in one division of the exam.



ARE 5.0 Item Development Subcommittee

Members of the ARE 5.0 Item Development Subcommittee will write, review, and edit items to be used in divisions of the ARE 5.0. Volunteers for this Subcommittee will be assigned to one divisional working group focusing on a division of the exam.

Volunteers should meet the following qualifications:

• Be an architect or related building systems engineer, and/or have architectural content area expertise in building codes or architectural legal issues.

Volunteer Expectations:

- Willingness to collaborate in a virtual environment (phone/online).
- It is anticipated that this subcommittee will meet for three (3) two-day face-to-face meetings during the fiscal year, as well as participate in online web meetings.
- Homework for this subcommittee will occur before each meeting; volunteers should expect to spend approximately 10-12 hours on homework per week during the weeks leading up to each meeting. Homework will also include the reviewing, editing and creating of graphics for associated items.

Divisional work group definitions:

ARE 5.0 Item Development Subcommittee: Practice Management Group
The Practice Management division focuses on issues related to pre-contract tasks including negotiation, human resource management and consultant development. Content areas include the management of architectural practice, professional ethics, fiduciary responsibilities, and the regulations governing the practice of architecture.

ARE 5.0 Item Development Subcommittee: Project Management Group
The Project Management division focuses on issues related to office standards, development of project teams and overall project control of client, fee and risk management. Content areas include the management of architectural projects including organizing principles, contract management and consultant management.

ARE 5.0 Item Development Subcommittee: Programming & Analysis Group
The Programming & Analysis division focuses on issues related to programming, site analysis, and zoning and code requirements. Content areas include the evaluation of project requirements, constraints and opportunities related to the project.

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Dear Colleagues,

From the buzz generated by our double-booth presence in early-June at the AIA Conference on Architecture (A'19) in Las Vegas, to the shared histories of our efforts and our volunteers at late-June's Centennial Annual Business Meeting (ABM), along with the diverse perspectives of participants at July's historic Accreditation Review Forum (ARForum19), the seemingly obvious concept of "community" continually showed its complex nature.

- A steady stream of licensure candidates, architectural media, current and former volunteers, and architects seeking updates kept staff and leadership on their feet and pulling out resources to inform the architectural community at the Las Vegas Convention Center.
- Our ABM keynoter, Pulitzer Prize laureate Thomas Friedman, challenged attendees to remain unfazed in "the age of accelerations" by doubling down on the fundamentals that distinguish humans from technology. Whether the role is regulator, architect, or citizen, Friedman posits that participating in the community is what will keep us optimistic and capable of coping with change as a constant factor.
- At the ARForum19, stresses on the capacity and potential of architectural education pushed attendees into big discussions on opportunities and roles, and specific discussions on process, all the while emphasizing the necessity of community as a common goal.


At the dawn of NCARB's second century, we are energized by the work ahead in sustaining our commitment to community. Our leadership is providing vision, our members are providing challenges, and our staff are designing approaches—assuring that "community" is constantly informing our perspective. We are expanding our "experience advisory committee" concept to invite the collateral community to address the entire NCARB portfolio in a new "Licensure Forum" to be chaired by Immediate Past President David Hoffman. We are convening the chairs of our major committees as a super-committee, chaired by First Vice President/President-elect Bob Calvani, charged with seeing how our programming efforts complement and inform each other.

President Terry Allers and NCARB staff are meeting in early-August with the community of licensing advisors at our biennial Licensing Advisors Summit (LAS). In this arena, our efforts have incorporated launching and sustaining virtual communities, convening these communities based on geography, and doing the necessary informational and accountability engagements at the LAS. This is true community-building, as we emphasize the role of advisors as mentors, instructors, and role models.

All of these community-focused activities, and the dozens of other volunteer and staff efforts underway will lay the foundation for our next *Analysis of the Practice of Architecture*. The analysis will include initial data gathering and planning in the coming year, followed by a full-scale data collection effort that attempts to capture a snapshot of architectural practice and its related perspectives, including those of architects, students, educators, and licensure candidates. We anticipate new tools to better achieve demographic diversity and findings that will deliver a solid basis for evolving our regulatory toolkit, enabling us to better serve the communities we support.



STRATEGIC PLAN

The latest iteration of the NCARB Strategic Plan was unveiled at the 2019 Centennial Annual Business Meeting to encourage strategic thinking at the Member Board level. The formal presentation of the plan was a high point of the meeting's first day, with the entire series of plenary presentations designed as a strategic focus on the future, including a keynote from Thomas Friedman, a set of challenges to consider put forward by the Futures Collaborative, and the "One New Idea" breakout sessions.



ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT & OFFICE LIFE

The NCARB staff held its annual off-site team-building retreat on July 30. Our team of brand ambassadors designed the morning session, featuring a series of tabletop exercises testing each other's knowledge of NCARB programs, the Strategic Plan data from the 2019 NCARB by the Numbers, and organizational history from our Centennial history book. For the third year in succession, the afternoon session was devoted to Rise Against Hunger, an international nonprofit that coordinates packaging and distribution of food and other life-changing aid to those in need. 





We are very pleased to announce that the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards (NCARB) is one of the founding members of the Alliance for Responsible Professional Licensing (ARPL)—a coalition of national associations that represents highly complex, technical professions and their national licensing boards.

ARPL has been created to ensure that a unified voice for advanced professions is present and heard in the debate around the appropriate level of licensure for professions and occupations. As many of you know, lawmakers around the country have proposed legislation that would weaken or even eliminate occupational licensing laws. While these proposals may not intentionally target our profession, we are at risk of being swept up in overly broad legislation.

This is why it is critical that advanced professions, like ours, band together to make sure we are effectively communicating the importance of professional licensing and what's at risk if licensing laws are weakened.

What Will ARPL Do?

ARPL's overarching goal is to educate policymakers and the public on the importance of—and the need to maintain—clear, responsible licensing standards within our professions.

Legal Counsel Outreach

Advocacy and External Engagement Update

Public Perception of Licensing Resource

In 2019, NCARB partnered with Benenson Strategy Group to explore public perception of licensure and regulation. Almost 1,000 registered voters were surveyed to better understand how people feel about regulation, licensing, and the architecture profession. NCARB developed a <u>one-page handout</u> of to help Member Boards take advantage of these data points in support of reasonable regulation and licensure. The handout offers a high-level overview of the public's sentiment of licensure in general, as well as additional information into the public's perception of architects. Governing Magazine

As reported in a recent article of published in Governing Magazine, Governor Greg Abbott (R-TX) signed a bill blocking local governments from forbidding children from selling lemonade and other similar beverages on private property. The author addresses the nuance of regulation and distinguishes between occupations that may benefit from reform and professions with proven and effective licensing and regulating processes: "But which professions require oversight? Deregulating lemonade stands is one thing. Giving free rein to professions that affect health and safety is something different entirely. There's no disputing that licensing does, in some cases, protect consumers."

ALEC Conference

The American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) recently convened for their annual meeting in Austin. Legislators from across the country met to discuss a wide range of issues, several of which are relevant to NCARB. The ALEC membership voted to pass two specific model act resolutions including the Model Interstate-Mobility and Universal-Recognition Occupational Licensing Act and the Occupational Licensing Review Act . While these model acts attempt to weaken professional standards, these types of proposals usually lack the necessary support to gain much traction in state legislatures. NCARB will continue to monitor these acts and provide updates and support, if needed.

Regulatory Models Survey

The Council on Licensure, Enforcement and Regulation (CLEAR) recently distributed a <u>survey</u> of to professional and regulatory organizations in all U.S. jurisdictions. The goal for this survey is to gather data on professional and occupational regulatory models across the country. The hope is that jurisdictions can connect and share ideas on what is working well and how they can learn from one another. The resource CLEAR is compiling will outline the different types of regulatory structures and which categories each jurisdiction falls into.

NCARB Releases Data on Licensure, Diversity, and Attrition

Each year, NCARB releases an annual data report, <u>NCARB by the Numbers</u> &, which provides insights into the makeup of candidates and metrics relating to the pursuit of architectural licensure. The 2019 edition includes updates to the number of U.S. architects, the time it takes to learn a license, diversity in the profession, analysis on attrition along the path to licensure, and a look-back at historical data celebrating NCARB's 100-year history.

For the first time, the resource includes exclusive data gathered in partnership with Beneson Strategy Group exploring the public perception of licensure and regulation. Key findings from the latest edition, which is based on data from the 2018 calendar year, include:

- Nearly 5,000 candidates completed their core licensure requirements.
- For the first time, over half of newly licensed architects started their NCARB Record while in school.
- Nearly 5,000 candidates completed the Architect Registration Examination® (ARE®).
- Over 6,000 licensure candidates completed the Architectural Experience Program® (AXP)®.
- Women now make up 50 percent of candidates beginning the AXP, the first time equityhas been seen at any career stage.
- Diversity continues to improve along early career stages—46 percent of new AXP candidates and 35 percent of new ARE candidates now identify as non-white.
- Men and women now remain on the path to licensure at equal rates.
- Non-white candidates are at least 25 percent more likely to stop pursuing licensure than white candidates.
- On average, candidates take 4.2 years to complete the AXP.
- Sixty-three percent of candidates overlap their experience and exams.



- On average, it takes 12.8 years to complete the core licensure requirements, which
 include earning a degree, completing the experience program, and passing the ARE.
- In 2018, there were 115,316 architects in the United States.
- Over a 10-year period, three out of every five candidates stay on the path to licensure.

Scheduling Blackout

For the past several months, NCARB staff and exam vendors have been testing a system update to the online test delivery platform candidates use at the Prometric test centers. To accommodate installation of the system updates, NCARB has worked with Prometric to **block candidates from scheduling appointments from September 30 – October 9, 2019.** Please expect no exam activity during this timeframe with regular score reporting returning after October 9.



OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING POLICY SEMINAR

CSG SOUTH & CSG MIDWEST + OCTOBER 3, 2019 - LEXINGTON, KY

Over the last 60 years, the number of jobs requiring an occupational license has grown from about 1 in 20 to nearly 1 in 4. When implemented properly, occupational licensing can help protect the health and safety of consumers by requiring practitioners to undergo a designated amount of training and education in their field. However, disparities in occupational licensing laws across states can create barriers for those looking to enter the labor market and make it harder for workers to relocate across state lines. Certain populations—including military spouses and families, immigrants with work authorization, people with criminal records, and unemployed and dislocated workers—are particularly affected by the requirements and variances of occupational licensing.

States are increasingly examining licensing criteria to ensure that existing and new licensing requirements are not overly broad, burdensome or restrictive, and that they do not create unnecessary barriers to labor market entry. Many states are also improving the portability and reciprocity provisions for selected occupations across state lines.

The Council of State Governments is pleased to host this one-day seminar on occupational licensing policy for members of CSG's South and Midwest regions. Programming will explore best practices from other states, policy to aid disproportionately affected populations and licensure reciprocity mechanisms such as interstate compacts. Participants in the seminar will become familiar with occupational licensing policy in their own state as well.

The seminar will be on October 3 in Lexington, Kentucky. CSG is providing hotel and travel costs to the seminar to ensure all interested members are able to participate. We look forward to seeing you in Lexington.

Dear Ms. Kathryn Patterson:

Effective July 1, 2019, the Foundation's advancement fee for endowed gifts will be set at 1.4%. In making this decision, the Board of Trustees considered two primary factors: Foundation operational deficits and the University's new campus Strategic Plan.

Over the past 5-years, the operational focus of the Foundation has been (1) increased collaboration with the Alumni Association, (2) improvements to operational efficiency while holding operational expenses flat, and (3) improving investment strategies and endowment returns. Through those efforts, we are working closely with the Alumni Association to engage alumni at every stage of their careers and recently achieved the best back-to-back fundraising years in the Foundation's history.

Though the Foundation has achieved these successes without an increase to its operating budget over a four-year period, it has operated under a deficit the past two years. This deficit was the result of the decrease in the endowment fee. When we set that diminishing fee plan, our strategy was to increase unrestricted giving to the Mines Annual Fund. Despite investing in external resources, the Mines Annual Fund peaked three years ago and has been unable to fully offset the decrease in endowment fees. This pattern reflects the recent focus shift in higher education by donors to restricted (directed purpose) giving.

To establish a sustainable operations funding model and increase development activities to meet future university needs, the Board of Trustees approved the endowment fee change while also working to increase funding support from the university. Together, these will offer operational sustainability to provide the resources necessary to encourage greater philanthropic support for the university. For perspective and transparency, we've also enclosed a document showing how we compare to other universities in our region.

Under the leadership of our University President, Dr. Jim Rankin, we are embarking on a new campus Strategic Plan to strengthen and elevate the university. The Foundation will be supporting the university in three principal areas: Scholarships, Facilities, and Programs. Dr. Rankin has set forth an aggressive vision to provide 4-year scholarships, build a new Mineral Industries building, and strengthen research activities. To successfully achieve this vision, the Foundation must elevate our practices and invest in additional development resources.

The fiduciary responsibility entrusted to the Foundation by our endowment holders is taken very seriously, and our pledge to endowment holders will always remain to honor their directed purpose to maximize support to the School of Mines. Our past and current successes can be attributed to the generous contributions of alumni, friends, faculty, staff, corporations, and foundations to support the many needs of our outstanding university. Our commitment to you is to continue to be great stewards of your generous gifts and elevating everything School of Mines.

Again, our sincere gratitude for your support of Mines.










