Advocacy and External Engagement Update

"What's New With Advocacy at NCARB?" Webinar

Member Boards are invited to attend an upcoming webinar to learn about the Alliance for Responsible Professional Licensing (ARPL). During the webinar, we will discuss additional ways to use data and support your work to protect the public health, safety, and welfare.

This webinar will be offered on two separate occasions: **Tuesday, October 8, at 1 p.m. ET** and **Thursday, October 10, at 3 p.m. ET**.

The Alliance for Responsible Professional Licensing

On September 11-13, the National Conference of State Legislatures hosted its annual occupational licensing meeting in Park City, Utah. The meeting welcomed key stakeholders with different perspectives related to licensing, regulation, and legislative topics. While a number of attendees expressed support for weaker licensure and regulation standards, ARPL members were able to voice support for the importance of reasonable licensure and regulation standards. Skip Braziel, Vice President of State Regulation and Legislation at the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, represented ARPL on a panel discussion about "Mitigating Unintended Consequences." Skip discussed the potential consequences of interstate compacts and consumer choice legislation. The session featured a mix of panelists with distinct vantage points on this topic, including William Stanley of the Southern Nevada Building and Construction Trades Council and Lisa Knepper of the Institute for Justice. Many attendees, particularly those involved directly in the political process, seemed encouraged by the passage of Arizona House Bill 2569 — legislation that expands reciprocity to newly qualified Arizona residents. ARPL will follow up with meeting organizers and select attendees to provide further educational information on the importance of professional licensure and regulation.



Public Perception of Licensing – Resource

In 2019, NCARB partnered with Benenson Strategy Group to explore the public perception of licensure and regulation—close to 1,000 registered voters were surveyed nationwide. To further utilize NCARB's survey data, we have developed a one-page handout targeted for policymakers, and for our Member Boards to share with stakeholders, that highlights public sentiment for reasonable regulation and licensure standards. While there was concern expressed about over-regulation, as the handout shows, professional licensing makes consumers feel safe and the public overwhelmingly supports architects being professionally licensed. We hope that these additional tools can help Member Boards educate their local lawmakers on the public sentiment of licensure and regulation. You can view or download the handout here $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{C}}$.

Legislative Update

While most state legislative sessions have adjourned for the year, we continue to monitor activity across a number of jurisdictions. Below are a few bills you may be interested in:

- Wisconsin Senate Bill 303 © This bill would clarify the education, experience, and examination requirements for registered interior designers. It also proposes stamping privileges on a limited but undefined scope of work for interior designers. Unlike interior design registration bills in other jurisdictions, this bill provides a definition of "interior life safety." It is defined as "the analysis, development, interpretation, review, and employment of space plans or interior components for existing or proposed interior spaces to provide for compliance with a building code or other law, ordinance, or rule to eliminate, reduce, or control life-threating or health-threatening situations, including to provide for egress or ingress to horizontal fire exit ways leading to predetermined vertical fire exit ways." This bill has been assigned to its first Senate committee meeting, and we will continue to monitor any activity. While the proposed legislation does not impact the authority of the Wisconsin Examining Board of Architects, Landscape Architects, Professional Engineers, Designers and Professional Land Surveyors, NCARB is tracking this bill due to the potential impact on the scope of practice within the jurisdiction for architects.
- Indiana Rule 19-431 © This recently proposed rule change clarifies the licensure process related to individuals with criminal backgrounds. Under the revised code, the board would have to explicitly list the criminal convictions of concern that may disqualify an individual from receiving a license. In addition, the board would have to establish criteria to determine whether an applicant should be denied a license due to a specific criminal conviction. Lastly, the board would have to establish a procedure for an individual to receive a pre-application determination as to whether the individual's criminal history precludes them from obtaining a license. This bill was proposed on September 17, 2019. NCARB will continue to monitor this legislation as it could potentially impact reporting requirements for the Indiana Board of Registration for Architects and Landscape Architects.







Dear Member Board Members and Administrators:

The Council will elect a new treasurer at the 2020 annual meeting in August. We're emailing to remind you of the qualifications and nomination process for the position.

The treasurer position is a three-year term. To qualify, you must be a current NCEES member board member who is a professional engineer, professional surveyor, or public member. The treasurer is an at-large position and the only position on the board of directors that a public member may hold. Having a public member on the NCEES board of directors can bring a different perspective and new ideas to the board's deliberations.

The NCEES *Bylaws* states that any member board nominations for treasurer must be filed with the NCEES CEO at least 60 days before the annual meeting (by June 26, 2020). The *Bylaws* also says that any delegate may make nominations for treasurer from the floor; such nominations from the floor must meet *Bylaws* requirements and be seconded by at least four member boards.

You can find all provisions related to the treasurer position online in the Bylaws at ncees.org/governance.

Rethinking Regulation - What Do You Think?

Board Meeting Outcomes

As a reminder, your Board of Directors conducts in-person meetings each quarter in December, March, June and September. To remain transparent in serving the needs of all member boards, approved meeting minutes are always <u>available here</u>.

At the September meeting, the Board continued to build on its strategic initiatives and participated in conversations around updates to and the operational impacts of the Exam Evolution, Rethink Regulation, and inter-organizational (ARPL, Presidents Council, ICOR) partnership projects.

Dear Colleagues,


During this first quarter year of NCARB's second century, several activities within the Council have encouraged exploration of how our ongoing mission may evolve. Our Board of Directors engaged in brainstorming on how to define Board success and to identify consensus areas for Board focus. Our vice presidents participated in a "North Star" exercise to develop an anchoring focus for departmental business planning. The composition of the new Licensure Advisory Forum was completed, and its external organization participants will engage in an expanded focus group regarding the entire portfolio of NCARB programs and initiatives. Our Model Law Task Force distributed a first draft of a new Model Law document that will be addressed via a resolution at the 2020 Annual Business Meeting.

We are laying the foundation for a year of renewed assessment of how NCARB can fully realize the goals within its recently adopted, refreshed Strategic Plan: Facilitate Licensure, Foster Collaboration, and Maximize Value. This assessment extends to designing a fresh approach to the Analysis of Practice, which will gather data to inform the next iteration of the Architect Registration Examination® (ARE®) and the Architectural Experience Program® (AXP®). We will be launching our new professional practice instruction toolkit in partnership with the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture (ACSA), President Terry L. Allers, FAIA, NCARB, Hon. FCARM, has formed workgroups to assess the adaptability of the Health, Safety, and Welfare (HSW) imperative to the urgencies of sustainability, resilience, and equity, and to outline the expansion of the NCARB white paper on resilience.

Our 2019 Centennial Annual Business Meeting Keynote speaker, Pulitzer Prize winner Thomas Friedman, reminded us that accepting change as a constant factor is the first step in maintaining optimism in this "age of acceleration." Our work to shape, anticipate, and include is thus both necessary and beneficial to those we serve. In the coming months we look forward to reporting out on how these efforts are delivering both desired results and unexpected dividends.



The collaborative met for the first time this fiscal year at NCARB's office in September.





- Presented the AXP Portfolio Sunset Review Report and facilitated the Board of Directors' discussion.



- Arizona House bill 2569 goes further than any other bill so far

- Nurse profession should be used as a model for other professions
- Usual targets including florists and cosmetologists

10:00 a.m. Nebraska Occupational Board Reform Act

- Focus on negative economic impact of regulations and licensure
- Mention of hair braiders and how much over-regulation exists in that space
- Laura and Sen. McCollister are still unsure if the bill will be successful
 - Only went in to effect July 1, 2019
- If opposition exists, 'why haven't other oppositions' been equally as opposed to weakening regulatory changes as NCARB.
- Goal includes to eliminate barriers to entry and improve transparency of licensure processes
- Mention by Laura: Interior Designers should maybe be able to stamp and seal documents because the work they do is similar to that of architects.
- Who benefits from increased licensure regulations?
- Professions should be able to answer the question: 'Can you show that without licenses, practitioners would harm the public?'
- Distinctions were made by the panelists among professions (medical professions vs. others).
 However, they argued it is important for each profession to be reviewed. Some occupations specifically targeted including cosmetology, interior design, and landscape architects.
- No partisan opposition to the bill apart from one vote and allegedly because the spouse of the legislator is an engineer.
- Senator McCollister mentioned the 'buyer beware' model may be something states should aspire to.
 - Trust the public to make informed decisions and evaluate qualifications without need to license.
- Questioning if a state (board) is even competent enough to license and if it necessary to protect
 the public HSW.

Council of State Governments - Occupational Licensing Learning Seminar October 3, 2019 - Lexington, KY

- Inconsistent standards nationwide among some professions provide for deregulatory talking points.
 - o Some professions have standards that are not uniform therefore some boards 'regulate all over the place'. 'inconsistency is a huge problem.'
 - o Licensing boards should establish clear criteria for licensure
 - Bullets points on website if necessary
 - Laura: the public never comes forward to advocate for regulation / against deregulation
 - Protecting HSW is paramount but regulations far exceed appropriate level

- Autonomous vs Centralized/Umbrella licensing structure
 - o Pros and cons of each
- Fees are always going to be a barrier to entry

 - Applicants should be able to petition board to see if applicant is even eligible for licensure based on criminal history
 - Barriers exist therefore boards should outline what those are proactively
 - O Cost and fees are also a major concern
- Military
 - Huge progress on expedited licensure in the past few years
 - Goal is to have compacts similar to nurses
 - o 30-day application review deadline (because active duty military relocate frequently)
- World Education Services
 - o Important to bridge international education with US education system
 - o Define barriers immigrants face
 - o Centralized/Umbrella licensing structure may be easier to navigate for immigrants than autonomous boards
 - Lack of information as to the who/what/when/where/why/how immigrants navigate licensure processes

Annual Quality Assurance Audit

A message from Emily Cronbaugh, executive director of the Wyoming State Board of Architects and Landscape Architects and chair of the Member Board Executives (MBE) Committee.

The annual Quality Assurance Audit (QAA) of Records transmitted by our Customer Relations Department took place in early-October. This year, the audit was completed by a workgroup comprised of board staff from Member Boards across the country who routinely receive and review transmittals from NCARB. The workgroup ambitiously reviewed and audited 154 randomly selected Records that were transmitted for licensure in the past year. The group later met with the MBE Committee to share the results of the audit, discuss the process, and present recommendations for future audits.

I look forward to sharing more information about the QAA and how it affects the daily work we do.

Member Board Executives Webinar Series

I am excited to partner with the Council Relations Department to initiate a new program for the MBE community. Beginning in December 2019, we will launch a new webinar series designed for MBEs and their staff. The QAA is a valuable tool that assists both the MBE community and the NCARB Customer Relations team by auditing Records of transmittals sent in a defined period of time—all to ensure the quality and accuracy of information that leads to a sound licensing decision by any board. Advocacy and External Engagement Update

Alliance for Responsible Professional Licensing Webinars

NCARB hosted two "What's New With Advocacy at NCARB?" webinars for Member Boards to learn more about the Alliance for Responsible Professional Licensing (ARPL). We also discussed additional ways to use data and support your work in protecting the public health, safety, and welfare. Access our audio recordings of and slide decks of.

Council of State Governments Seminar

On October 3, the Council of State Governments (CSG) held an Occupational Licensing Policy Learning Seminar in Lexington, Kentucky. CSG convened the seminar to discuss potential reforms to occupational licensing. A few NCARB Member Board Members (MBMs), MBEs, and NCARB staff were in attendance. CSG panelists and other speakers presented various occupational reforms, such as interstate licensure compact legislation and regulatory changes to address disproportionately affected populations (e.g., low-income individuals, military personnel, and their spouses). Although several attendees expressed support for



reforms that may weaken current licensing standards, NCARB staff voiced support for reasonable regulation and licensure standards. Also in attendance was Executive Director of the South Dakota Board of Technical Professions Kathryn Patterson, who explained to attendees the importance of licensing, regulating the practice of architecture, and the responsibility the board has to protect the public health, safety, and welfare.

Governor Abbott's Letter to State Agencies

Texas Governor Greg Abbott recently sent a letter to all state agencies to consider reforming their occupational licensing rules. His overarching request of states agencies is to "take all appropriate actions under existing statutory authority to help Texans" and to "reduce unnecessary and burdensome licensing regulations that hurt workers and consumers." Governor Abbott suggested several considerations, notably:

- Assessing whether existing licensing regulations help or hinder Texans' right to earn a living
- Identifying less-restrictive alternatives to licensure, such as bonding, insurance, registration, or certification
- Identifying other jurisdictions with licensing requirements that are substantially equivalent to Texas' licensing requirements, as required by last session's Senate Bill (SB) 1200
- Recognizing substantially equivalent out-of-state occupational licenses for people who
 are in good standing in all states where they are licensed
- Accepting professional experience as a substitute for licensure in cases where a person moves to Texas from a state that does not license their occupation

In addition, state agencies were asked to examine fees and educational requirements, including:

- Developing and implementing plans to reduce license application fees to 75 percent or less of the national average for equivalent or comparable occupations
- Reducing excessive educational and work experience requirements—absent compelling evidence that doing so would not adequately protect the public interest
- Considering reductions in licensure and examination fees for Texas residents who are eligible for certain public assistance programs
- Expanding the acceptance of online continuing education credits for residents who cannot attend continuing education classes in person

Finally, state agencies should remove barriers to licenses for people with criminal records where appropriate, including:

- Publishing lists of specific criminal offenses that disqualify applicants from obtaining or maintaining an occupational license, or at least limiting the exclusion to only those offenses that directly relate to the duties and responsibilities of the occupation
- Exempt arrests that did not result in conviction or placement on deferred adjudication community supervision for the purposes of determining a person's fitness for a licensed occupation, consistent with last session's SB 1217



In his letter, Governor Abbott encourages state licensing boards in Texas to identify opportunities for reasonable regulation that will best serve the public. His letter suggests a collaborative effort to work in partnership with state agencies. As a result of this request, NCARB has provided data and information to the board. We will continue to support the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners as it continues to address any future requests.

Travel Restriction Feedback Needed

The ability to attend NCARB meetings, participate in volunteer committees, and attend trainings provides board members and executives with the opportunity to engage with their peers at a regional and national level. Chapter 1 of each of the I-Codes is widely viewed as the most important chapter in each of those publications. Although many jurisdictions modify the chapter to some degree, the fundamental concepts and principles typically remain to guide users in the code's proper application and administration. The seminar will focus on two primary areas of emphasis: 1) application of the provisions based on the concepts of minimum standard, AHJ interpretative authority, alternate methods of materials, and coordination of potential conflicting provisions, and 2) administrative functions including code official, plan reviewer and inspector responsibilities.
