Demand data is the summation of job openings estimated due to projected employment growth and job openings projected to be created due to the separation of current workers. Separation of workers is estimated by multiplying occupational employment estimates by national separation rates supplied by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). These rates estimate the number of job openings, by occupation, which will be attributed to workers exiting, transferring and changing occupations all together. Average annual demand data are calculated by dividing by ten, the number of years in the projection period.
