What They Do

Please note: this title represents a nationally combined group of occupations for which data collection is currently underway. Information is limited and tentative at this time. Medical dosimetrists develop radiation treatment plans, calculate radiation doses and oversee treatment. Medical records specialists organize and code health information data for insurance purposes, for databases and registries, and to maintain patients' medical and treatment histories. Other health technicians and technologists perform a variety of unique tasks involved in providing specific patient treatment.
